### Sample Independent listening task – Green tourism

#### Examiner rubric

You're going to hear a talk about tourism. You will hear the talk twice. The first time, just listen. Then I'll ask you to tell me generally what the speaker is talking about. Are you ready?

Now listen to the task again. This time make some notes as you listen, if you want to. Then I'll ask you what the speaker says the advantages and disadvantages of green tourism are. Are you ready?

*The task will play once.*

Now tell me what the speaker says the advantages and disadvantages of green tourism are. I'll stop you after one minute.

#### Audio script

Hello and welcome to this week's podcast, all about green tourism. Green tourism is becoming an important part of the travel industry and is generally seen as a positive step.

Although not everyone is convinced that green tourism is such a good thing, let's start with one of the advantages. First of all, the most interesting types of green holiday are conservation holidays, where you can help take care of wildlife. I think you'll agree that that's more exciting than what some of us do – just sit on a beach! And much better for the planet!

Another important effect of green tourism is that owners of hotels and so on are making their accommodation more eco-friendly these days. It's true that green tourists definitely prefer to stay in places where their hosts care about the environment.

And a further example of positive change is given by local businesses. As green travel becomes more popular, more local businesses like restaurants and transport companies offer environmentally-friendly services. We need to remember the important role green travel plays in encouraging businesses to become more responsible.

In fact, green tourism goes beyond environmental benefits. As more money stays in the community, local people invest in developing businesses and jobs are created. This leads to stronger and more stable communities with hopes for the future.

All this may be so, but green tourism doesn't just have advantages. Let's look at some of the disadvantages. Unfortunately, the popularity of green tourism can encourage dishonest travel companies to offer so-called green holidays, that actually prove to be more harmful to the environment.

Of course, there *are* genuine green travel companies. But a downside of green holidays is that they are often very expensive and few people can afford them. What's the point of offering environmentally-friendly holidays if many people won't be able to go on them?

Finally, what happens when green tourism becomes popular in rural areas? These areas could become too full of people, which could change the local culture – even if tourists try their best to limit their environmental impact. That would be a great pity, wouldn't it?

So, as tourists, perhaps we need to start thinking more carefully before we choose our next holiday.

## Answers

**Main point/gist:** The speaker is talking about the positive and negative effects of green tourism (any broadly similar formulation is acceptable).

### Possible responses to task

#### Advantages of green tourism

- ▶ Conservation holidays/holidays where you take care of wildlife are more interesting/better for the planet
- ▶ (Hotel) owners make their accommodation more eco-friendly
- ▶ Can encourage businesses to be more environmentally friendly/responsible
- ▶ Money stays in the community/is invested in businesses, creating jobs

#### Disadvantages of green tourism

- ▶ Dishonest companies offer (so-called green) holidays that can harm the environment
- ▶ Expensive, so people can't afford environmentally friendly holidays
- ▶ Too many people (in rural areas) can change local culture
