Digital Classical and Jazz Music Grades & Diplomas Checklist

Making your booking

- Where will you place your booking? Will you be booking via our online booking site, or through a Trinity representative at your school, music service or Trinity exam centre? If you are submitting via one of our representatives/centres do check any deadlines or timescales they have for taking entries.
- Have you entered for the right grade? It is always worth double checking this.
- Have you been studying from the 'Classical & Jazz' or 'Rock & Pop' syllabus? Some instruments, such as keyboards and drums, are available across both, so make sure you enter for the right exam.
- Are you taking our Technical Work pathway or Repertoire-only pathway for your exam? You can check this based on how many songs you are playing and if you are playing technical work such as scales and arpeggios.
- Have you let us know if you require any adjustments to be made for your exam by completing the Special Needs Provision form? You need to do this when you make your booking or as soon as possible after.
- Have you received your log-in details for our Trinity Submission Platform? These will go to the email address provided for the applicant and submitter when the booking was made. This should be sent within 24 hours of you making your booking or submitting your order.
- Will you be including your own choice of repertoire in your diploma programme? Remember, you need approval for this before you make your booking.

✓ Preparing your performance

- Have you looked at the syllabus for Digital Grades or Digital Diplomas? When preparing for a digital exam you will need to use the digital syllabus in addition to the syllabus for your instrument.
- Are you using a current instrumental syllabus? Make sure you aren't mixing pieces/technical work from old and new syllabuses. Details of any syllabus overlap arrangements can be found on the relevant syllabus page of our website.
- Have you chosen pieces/songs from the correct lists? Remember, for some grades, they can't all be from the same group, and there are specific language requirements for singers at the higher grades.
- Have you made arrangements for your accompaniment? Whilst live accompaniment is encouraged for most instruments, backing tracks and pre-recorded accompaniments are permitted for all digital exams. Please note that, where a syllabus states a piece is to be performed accompanied, this is a requirement and there are no allowances for it to be performed unaccompanied.
- Are you performing on a digital instrument for your exam and is it permitted? Most instruments for Classical & Jazz exams will be acoustic; however, for Piano and Drum Kit exams, digital instruments are permitted up to certain grades.
- Have you looked at the technical work requirements? Candidates can choose from groups of technical work which must be performed as part of the exam video submission.
- Are you using an own composition option? Make sure you have looked at the parameters for this to ensure they match the standard for the grade.
- If you are a diploma candidate, have you checked you are fulfilling the programme duration requirements?

Filming your video

- Take a look at our filming guidance before you film your video. You could also watch our how to film your submission video.
- Have you filmed your exam as one continuous performance (this includes all performance pieces and technical work)? If there is any evidence of editing, then we will not be able to assess your exam.
- If you are doing the Technical Work Pathway you can perform your technical work before or after your pieces, but don't intersperse technical work between your pieces, as this will interrupt the Overall Performance criteria.
- Are you (hands, face and feet if needed) and your instrument visible for the whole video? Take a look at our instrument specific guidance on where the camera should be positioned.
- Watch your performance back; are there any disruptions or background noise? Check the sound quality, are you happy with levels of backing tracks, accompaniments etc? Can your instrument/voice be heard clearly?
- Have you shown your music to the camera at the start of the recording? Even if you have played from memory, we need to see that legal copies of the music has been obtained. If you have been playing from a download, make sure the licensing information is visible.
- For syllabuses that require technical work to be played from memory, you must close your music book and set the music stand aside. You may use a list of the requirements, but you must hold this list up to the camera before placing it on the music stand. You can rewrite the requirements in a way which is clear to you, but no additional information should be added. It is also acceptable to have someone read the scales and requirements out to you.
- For the Technical Work Pathway have you considered the Overall Performance criteria of the exam? How will you deliver your performance? Perhaps try performing your pieces/songs in a mini recital to your family before recording.

Uploading your submission

- Once you have received your submission link you will have four weeks to submit your exam.
- For graded exams, have you uploaded copies of pieces that are not from published Trinity graded music exam books? Diploma candidates should upload all performances pieces.
- The recommended maximum size for your video file is 1GB. This should be big enough for most videos, but if your video is larger than that, please consider reducing it by using a video compressor app. If you are struggling to upload take a look at our guidance on preparing your video for upload.
- After you press submit on your form did you get an email notification confirming your submission?
